Also, hydration (aka drink lots of water) is also very important. You can never drink too much water.



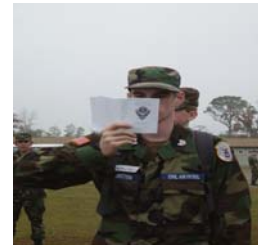
