How to Survive Encampment

How to Make a Bed

So life at encampment will be easier, this article will show you (with words and pictures) how to make your bed properly.

The first step is to place one sheet on the mattress and then pull it tight and tuck in the side on the foot of the bed. The best way to accomplish this to crawl underneath the bed and pull it even tighter. The bottom of the sheet should be even with the edge of the mattress. The top sheet gets a hospital corner. For that, take the corners at the foot of the bed and put your arm and place it under the long section hanging from the bed.



Tuck in whatever is left. Then do the same for the other side.

After that, tuck in the long sections at the bottom. Again, crawl underneath and pull

the sheet tight.



The top of the sheet should be 18 inches from the headboard so that the fold in the sheet is 6 inches. The end result is that the sheet 12 inches from the headboard.

With two people making the bed, have one hold the top while the other does the bottom. Fold two more hospital corners at the foot of the bed while a second person holds the sheet at the top.

Make sure that it does not move from its

position. Do not tuck in the long section. Leave it out and place the blanket on the bed. Put the top of the blanket 18 inches from the head of the bed. Finish the hospital corner with both the blanket and top sheet. Finally, fold the sheet down. The fold should be 6 inches wide and 18 inches from the head of the bed to the top of the fold.



Your military-style bed is now complete.
